own classroom. She taught 2nd grade in a Title 1 public school in Orlando, Florida, in an impoverished, crime-ridden area of town. This is her first year at TAA and she has decided "middle school is for me!" Mrs. Faber says

1. I am intentional about paying attention to my students' interests. I try to incorporate their current interests into lessons so they connect the material to their lives.

2. I teach my students the importance of being a good friend. We have had several in-class workshops on how to be uplifting and conscious of others who are in need of kind words. We focus on the positive rather than the negative.

3. We enjoy creativity in our class! I want to teach my students not to be afraid of expressing their

little kids anymore, but they aren't quite preteens. I try my best to be a good role model. I want my students to see that living a Christian life can be fun and is full of happiness, excitement, and joy." She emphasizes having fun while learning, teaching students to laugh at their mistakes and work cooperatively with others. Mrs.

Faber is also passionate about reading: her students have "Book Walks, introducing new reading material about relevant topics. It's like a movie trailer, but for books! I also share which

books I am reading." Mrs.
Faber's favorite scripture is
Psalm 34:5, "Those who look to Him
are radiant. Their faces are never
covered in shame."

Mrs. Vargas graduated from Southwestern Adventist University in 2010 with a Bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and has taught seventh and eighth grades at TAA for seven years. This year, she has the largest number of students of any TAA classroom.

"I love the work that God is doing

here at TAA, and am so glad that He has given me the opportunity to be a part of the ministry that goes on here!"

Mrs. Vargas applies TAA's "Thrive!" motto: "Thriving means there is security in the environment. A student must feel safe physically and emotionally in order to thrive. The seventh and eighth grade classroom is a place where security in learning is promoted," she



explains. To her, thriving also means positive cooperation with others. "At the beginning of the year, I take my class on a trip to the ropes course where they maneuver through a series of challenges and activities to learn how to work together as a team to help everyone feel successful at the end of the day. Each day we learn to support and encourage each other as a classroom family."

Mrs. Vargas practices "inviting Jesus into our classroom each morning and experiencing His love throughout the day. We begin each day with prayer. We spend time acknowledging the things He has done and



the prayers that have been answered." Her students take responsibility for their own work by monitoring their own grades and she gives them strategies for improving their grades. "I also promote time

management skills. For example, if we finish a class with a few minutes to spare, I

encourage my students to work on any other homework that they have so that they have more time after school for other things!"

Mrs. Vargas' favorite scripture is Proverbs 4:13: "Hold on to instruction, do not let it go; guard it well, for it is your life." Both Mrs. Faber and Mrs. Vargas are guided



by the Elementary Vice Principal, Mrs. Kim Bokovoy. As a team, they work together to make sure TAA middle students are well-prepared for heaven and earth!

Korean Student Program

Twelve brave Korean children in grades 3-8 joined TAA on January 1, 2017. The students come from

several private schools in South Korea and stay for two months to improve their English speaking skills. Brit and Jennifer Whittington have hosted 1-2 students each year for the five years TAA has hosted the program.



All of the Korean

students spend one week in Florida visitng
DisneyWorld, Universal Studios, Sea World, and of
course, the white sugar sands and emerald ocean. The
Whittingtons enjoy taking their student guests to many
local Tulsa attractions such as the Gilcrease Museum to
learn about Oklahoma history; Purple Glaze to paint
pottery; scavenger hunts, and sometimes the trampoline
park for those wiggly days! "There is a very formal
hierarchy in Korean culture that does not exist here,"
says Jennifer, "so that is an adjustment for them."

She lets "her" girls cook meals ~ quesadillas are a favorite ~ and bake lots of cookies! Amelia Whittington has noticed that most of the girls who stay with them really enjoy eating a "bird in a nest" which is an egg fried in a piece of bread. The Whittingtons have kept in touch with many of their Korean guests and one has stayed with them twice. "It's nice when families send siblings back to us," says Jennifer. The TAA bus drove the students to Dallas for their departure the last week of February. Time to get ready for the next student exchange!
