A SOLEMN REMINDER

TAA marked the anniversary of the 9/11 bombing by including all students in its observance, most of whom were not born when this horrific event occurred. Mrs. Vargas reports that the 7th and 8th grade classes spent the day “remembering” the events that took place and honoring those who died. The class watched a video of the live news footage as it unfolded on that tragic day 16 years ago. Most of the students had never seen the footage, and were shocked over and over again at the horror of what had happened. After watching the footage, they spent time reading articles that were written on the 10 year anniversary of 9/11. These articles were written by loved ones of people who had died that day. The students reflected on how each of the people in these articles did something unique to remember their loved one.



Later in the morning, the entire student body met in the gymnasium, formed a circle and held hands during prayer for the victims’ families. The students were very respectful and thoughtful throughout this day of remembrance.

TAA OFFERS DUAL ENROLLMENT OPTION

Several TAA seniors are working on dual enrollment classes at Tulsa Community College. The collaboration is for Freshman Composition I, College Algebra, and Introduction to Psychology. If your junior or senior wants to take one of these classes, they must meet the following requirements by December 15, 2017:

- 3.0 high school GPA;
 - an ACT composite score of 19 or SAT ERW and Math of 1140 (take test no later than October 31, 2017);
 - acceptable citizenship and attendance record; and
 - home school students need to provide a transcript.

HOME & SCHOOL

Home and School Leader Jennifer Cross and volunteers Jason Vargas, Jake Schellenberg, Mr. & Mrs. Rocha, and many others helped set up new playground equipment recently. The work bee was successful, with many students and families helping. Ms. Cross says that the "Playground equipment has aged out, was unsafe and the surface needed to be changed to recycled rubber," to comply with Oklahoma standards. High school students will be painting the tires for the sand area.

Other improvements are age-appropriate areas of equipment for pre-K through 6th grade; and a sand area overlapping with the 6-12th grade area. Pre-K now has a Fisher-Price structure; resurfacing, and a dedicated swing set; picnic tables; resurfacing around the climbing structure; new seats and chains on the old swing set and soon, new surface mats. Ms. Cross

has plans to add some trees for shade, and may have some other landscaping features added during the year, such as bird feeders, flowers, and other plants that attract nature such as butterflies.

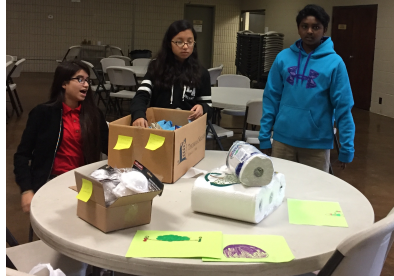
